# WORKSHOPS AND PROGRAMS

**9:00 AM.** "Steamboats, Rivers, Railroads & Canals.: a Yankee Clock Peddling Venture in the 'Tucky-Ho'." Mary Jane Dapkus will give a presentation focusing on the history of a hitherto unknown clock peddling firm, Seth Wheeler & Co., and its adventures and misadventures transporting clocks to the Bluegrass region of Kentucky between 1836 and 1840. Mary Jane has backgrounds in both science and American history. Her background and employment history includes several years spent as a fingerprint examiner, and more recently, an environmental analyst, before undergoing a career change one year ago, to become the assistant curator of the American Clock & Watch Museum, Bristol, CT.

**10:30 AM. "Part 3 – Uses of the Lathe." John Losch** will complete his series of technical lectures begun at the Auburn meeting in April of this year. This lecture will show a range of horological work that can be performed on a toolmaker's lathe and on an engine lathe. It will include making springs for Connecticut clock levers, ways to hold work, wheel cutting on the lathe, boring wheels, drilling small holes in a large lathe,

different ways to polish awkward pivots, and anything else that time allows. Some demonstrations will be illustrated with pictures and possibly with video images. Questions are invited and encouraged, although sometimes his answer will be, "I don't know." John is a retired clockmaker living in Holliston, MA.

#### 12:00 Noon. Luncheon

12:45 PM, Luncheon Program. "Stephen Badlam, Dorchester cabinetmaker." Robert Mussey will give a presentation about this extremely successful cabinetmaker including making clock cases for the Willard family. Recent discovery by Robert of many of Badlam's personal and business papers shows he was also adept at advancing his other careers. The lecture will explore Badlam's numerous marked pieces of furniture, his family-based system of apprentice training and journeyman work, and his adaptability in responding to the changing fortunes of the economy, workshop fires, personal tragedy and war. Robert has been a furniture conservator since 1978, first with the Henry Ford Museum, later founding the labs at the Society for the Preservation of New England Antiquities, and then his own firm in 1989. Clients include major museums, historic houses, and federal institutions such as The State Department, the White House and US Senate. He has been particularly interested in work requiring special research and is a regular contributor to Sothebys auction sale catalogues. Robert was author in 2003 of The Furniture Masterworks of John and Thomas Seymour, and Guest Curator of an exhibit of their work at the Peabody Essex Museum.

#### **Directions:**

<u>From the East or West</u>: Mass Turnpike (I-90), take Exit 10, then stay to the right after exiting the toll plaza and to Southbridge St. (Route 12) going south. The Elks Club is about 0.6 mile on the right.

<u>From the North</u>: follow Route 290 to Exit 6, then to Route 20 West. Follow Route 20 to the 4<sup>th</sup> set of lights (Route 12 intersection). Turn right (north) on to Route 12. The Elks Club is about 0.3 mile on the left. Note: the exit for Route 20 West off of Route 290 in the very first exit after the Mass Turnpike. The exit comes up quickly, so be aware of this situation.

<u>From the South</u>: follow Route 395 (becomes Route 290 in Auburn) and take Exit 6 for Route 20 West. Proceed to the 4<sup>th</sup> set of lights (the junction of Routes 12 and 20) and turn right on to Route 12 North. The Elks Club is about 0.3 mile on the left.
